So, you've always wanted to take good pictures of birds, or in particular, owls. You invested thousands of dollars into getting "the right camera", and spent almost \$10,000 on a huge lens. You've gone through the months, or even years of learning to get the most out of your expensive equipment and now feel confident enough to go out and get some shots. Then you run into the part where you have to ...spot a bird – an owl, get close to it without scaring it off, and grab that all-important "killer shot" you've always dreamed of.

All that time, money, and hard work, got you to that point, but there's another step further that will set your photo apart from others. It's called "having an artistic eye", or simply being able to make an interesting composition on the spot.

My story is I didn't use an expensive camera (not a 1DX, not a D4, or D800, or D600, not a 5DMk3, not even a 7D... in fact it's a lowly old D300). Most of all I didn't use an expensive lens either (something I picked up for about 1/10th the cost of a huge supertele lens). What you see is the full-frame capture of a beautiful Burrowing Owl not only posing, but making eye contact with the camera, at all of the sensor's 12.3 MP glory.

There's also a neat fact that it was done hand-held. You know, at this proximity, the slightest sight of a tripod in your hand would send the poor bird packing in a hurry.
